Six projects totalling £15,360:

1. Pro Corda Trust

Sensory Garden, Leiston Abbey

£2,500

To build and develop a sensory garden for young people with special educational needs who come to Leiston Abbey throughout the year in conjunction with a leading garden and landscape designer, providing an area of engagement, reflection, stimulation and peace.

2. Leiston-cum-Sizewell Town Council

Leiston Community Orchard Fencing

£5,000

To develop a recently acquired space (redundant primary school field) and rework it by erecting fencing and gates to protect the new, freely accessible community orchard and sports facilities, keeping the sports area dog free.

3. Suffolk Wildlife Trust

Wild Beach, Wild Belts, Wild Woods

£1,460

Families from the communities closest to Sizewell, Thorpeness and Kenton Hills will come together to access and understand the area's wildlife and reflect on the landscape's value in their lives, encouraging parents to experience the outdoors with their children through adventure challenges and nature based activities.

4. Sudbourne Park Printmakers

Digging for History/Archaeology Workshops

£1.200

Working with children and teachers from Cold Fair Green and Leiston Primary Schools to explore archaeology through printmaking. Two workshops would be run for the children with an additional workshop especially for teachers. The latter will 'teach the teachers' how to do 'printmaking without a press', which they can take back to their schools and use.

5. Thorpeness and Aldringham Heritage Group (TAHG)

Thorpeness Heritage Walk

£1,200

Creation of a Heritage Walk in historic Thorpeness by means of 10 x "story-boards" around the village, with a supporting illustrated map and guide to the history of landmarks in the village. This application is for four of the proposed boards.

6. Theberton & Eastbridge Parish Council

Eastbridge Common

£4,000

Improvements at Eastbridge Common, to restore its amenity for the benefit residents and to support wildlife
