1 East Anglian Sailing Trust Awarded £650

Discovering the River Orwell

A sailing adventure on The River Orwell, giving disadvantaged younger children the opportunity to appreciate, discover and learn about all aspects of the river.

2 Friends of Hollesley School Awarded £700

Hollesley School wildlife area

To create a forest school area within the grounds at Hollesley School. To develop the existing wildlife area.

3 The Shotley Heritage Charitable Community Benefit Society Ltd Awarded £700

Shotley Pier birdwatching noticeboard

A noticeboard with images of birdlife seen in the River Stour, at Shotley Pier so people can learn what kind of birds they are seeing. A chalkboard to record daily sightings.

4 Transition Woodbridge Awarded £216

Woodbridge and Melton 5-minute Litter Pick

The creation of Litter Pick Stations, which can be used by anyone who would like to pick up litter in the Woodbridge / Melton area.

5 The Suffolk Coast DMO Awarded £666
